Visit to Jerusalem Ridge By Ben Essary

Last February, Pam and I took somewhat of a bluegrass odyssey. We visited the International Bluegrass Music Museum, traveled through the home country of the Stanley Brothers and the Carter Family and got to play music with family in Tennessee. Enroute, I also inherited a 1954 Martin D-18 from my uncle. One of the real highlights of the trip was a visit to Rosine, Kentucky and a tour of the Monroe home place on Jerusalem Ridge.

The Bill Monroe Foundation has a visionary plan to preserve the music, memorabilia associated with the Monroe Brothers, and the Jerusalem home place. The foundation has already restored the Monroe home and acquired Bill's F-5 mandolin.

We thought we were out of luck for the tour when we saw a sign on the entrance road that said tours were conducted from May through September. Disappointed, we went on to the Rosine store where the lady running the store said she could arrange a tour if we wanted. In short order we were at the home with a very friendly and informed personal tour guide.

As you can see by the photograph, the home is completely restored and is filled with many of the family's possessions. Bill's bedroom is furnished with the furniture he used as a child. A mandolin similar to the one his mother played laid on the bed.

The house is set at the top of Jerusalem Ridge and is surrounded by treed and rolling hills. It was easy to envision a large and busy family going about their rural lives and a boy soaking in the knowledge to become the most important figure in bluegrass music. In fact, it seemed you could almost hear the music – Uncle Pen and Birch's fiddles, Bill's mandolin and Charlie's guitar.

MONROE HOME



The foundation has aggressive plans. As I said they have already restored the home and acquired Bill's mandolin. Future plans include, among other things, constructing a museum to honor Bill and the Bluegrass Boys, the Monroe Family and the music; purchasing and restoring Uncle Pen's cabin; purchasing the entire Monroe farm and restoring Rosine to an authentic 1920's appearance. The cost of the entire plan is \$16 million.

If you are a lover of bluegrass music and a fan of Bill Monroe, you should not miss a trip to Jerusalem Ridge.

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

Lost Highway is built around the smooth lead singing and rhythm guitar of Ken Orrick. His rich, soulful voice and his fine original songs, written in the best traditional style, define the Lost Highway sound. He is a stylist in the tradition of his musical mentors: the Stanley Brothers, Larry Sparks, Lester Flatt and Melvin Goins. Ken has performed

often at festivals and shows with many of these bluegrass legends and more. He is also a top-notch banjo player and hails from Smithville, Tennessee. Eric Uglum, founding member of nationally-known bands Weary Hearts and Copperline, applies his powerful and heartfelt vocals as well as his expressive lead playing and insistent, clean rhythm on both mandolin and guitar. Dick Brown has played and recorded with notables such as Lynn Morris, Traditional Bluegrass and Pacific Crest. His banjo playing provides drive in the Lost Highway sound, yet his tasteful backup is always appropriate to any ballad. Fiddler Paul Shelasky plays in the style of his mentors Benny Martin and Scotty Stoneman. He has recorded on over twenty-five

albums and has played and toured with the Good Ol' Persons, Frank Wakefield, Tony Rice and David Grisman. Marshall Andrews has been performing traditional acoustic music all his life. His rock-solid timing and great tone on the bass are an integral part of the Lost Highway sound and he has twice performed as an International Bluegrass Music Association showcase artist with the band Copperline in 1997 and Lost Highway in 1998. The members of Lost Highway are united in their love and respect for traditional bluegrass and their commitment to ensembleship. With their unforgettable trio harmonies, instrumental prowess and relaxed, friendly stage manner, they are sure to be a hit at any festival or on any concert stage.

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CD Review: Thirty Years and Counting Mike and Tari Conroy By Ted Lowe

Mike and Tari Conroy have a brand new CD out, titled *Thirty Years and Counting*. As the title suggests, this CD marks the Conroys' 30th year of marriage and making music together, and contains some of their finest playing and singing to date. This recording features the Conroys doing some of their favorite bluegrass songs that they've gathered and written through the years, singing in their distinctive "mother duet" style of vocal harmony, with instrumental accompaniment provided by Mike on mandolin and standup bass and Tari on guitar. Long-time fans will be pleased to hear Tari step into the lead and do some picking on the Bill Monroe's "Tombstone Junction".

Mike and Tari recorded and mastered *Thirty Years and Counting* in their very own Conroy Digital Sound Studio. The excellent quality of the recording reflects the hard work and talent that has gone into creating a studio tailored perfectly to the music that Mike and Tari make. This CD provides a well-balanced mixture of songs, featuring familiar gospel and bluegrass standards, as well as more obscure and original tunes that make this recording a good source of new ideas and material. 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
