Plenty of shade, a creek right along side and lots of trails for hiking, biking and 4-wheeling. The camping is dry with no electricity or water available. The association plans to rent port-a-potties.

We will have potlucks Friday and Saturday night. Saturday night the MRBA will provide the meat course for the meal. Sunday morning the MRBA will provide sausage and gravy with biscuits. We will also have a free raffle for some surprise gifts.

Directions to the campout...drive south from Darby, take the West Fork Road (just like you do to go to Conroy's Memorial Campout) but stay on the main road and follow the signs to Painted Rocks Reservoir, go around the lake (on the left side of the lake) and continue south for several miles until you reach Hughes Creek on the left, take that road (it will take you right past the old Alta Ranger Station.... the first ranger station in Montana) Continue on the Hughes Creek road until you see the Thunder Mountain road (approx 3/4 mile) that takes off to the right and approximately 100 yards or so on that road you will turn left onto a big ponderosa pine covered flat. There is plenty of room for larger outfits. Signs will be posted to help you along the way.

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Who Will Sing for Me

... by Caroline Keys So many folks have priceless Jimmy Martin stories to tell. Mine starts after his life was over. I graduated from college on Saturday, May 14, 2005. My parents, who introduced me to Jimmy Martin's music long before I could drop the needle on a record player, were in Missoula to celebrate. After the ceremony, I had the great fortune to pick with my father, my band leader (Nate Biehl), and my fiancé (Brian Herbel) all at once. I couldn't think of three more inspiring, influential men in my life. Except maybe Jimmy Martin. It was hearing Jimmy's "20/20 Vision" on a tape that my Dad made for blanket. me ten years ago that flipped my bluegrass switch. I had grown up in the Appalachians, surrounded by great music but opted to listen to the commercial junk that got piped in on K92FM. K92's slogan was "Playing the hits for Roanoke, Lynchburg, and tapes that I bought a capo and joined the New River Valley." 50 years earlier, that would have been the description of a killer radio station, but in 1980s, it was mostly Madonna. Jimmy Buffet was about as far from the mainstream as I ventured until I heard Jimmy Martin.

My first week in Missoula, I went down to the TopHat guitarless on a Tuesday to check out the jam. I didn't even own a capo. I was so excited to hear "Sunny Side of the Mountain" and other songs from my Dad's in the jam the next week. From then on I got to participate in singing songs like "Hold Whatcha Got," "Sophronie," and "Hit Parade of

These days, my band owns a couple of copies of the fantastic documentary DVD on Jimmy called "King of Bluegrass: The Life and Times of

> Jimmy Martin." If you haven't seen the movie, go buy it-I think its less than \$20. Broken Valley Roadshow has picked up several Jimmy-isms from the footage to yell at one another during practice.


But back to the graduation party...after Mom and Dad went to bed, a group of us Reilly's cabin in Pattee Canyon. At one point I took a breather by the bonfire and



Ellen Buchanan informed me that Jimmy had died that day. After hearing this, Ted Lowe, Damian Mast, John Long, Nate Baker, Matt Cornette, Nate Biehl, Brian Herbel, and I played every Jimmy Martin tune we could come up with. It was getting chilly up there in Patee Canyon, and kind of lonesome, knowing that the King of Bluegrass had passed on. And then something funny happened. Greenish beams appeared in the sky as if announcing some kind of grand opening or celebrity arrival in heaven. Soon the beams faded and the entire sky burst into a pulsing, fiery explosion that I'm sure was brought on by Jimmy's soul banging at the Pearly Gates. None of us could go to bed with the Northern Lights dancing the way they did, so we did the right thing and picked on into the night.

After that amazing experience, Brian and I went to Tennessee to visit family. We couldn't help but seek out Jimmy's grave a little northeast of Nashville. I took a moment next to Jimmy's famous gravestone that continued to pick up at Steve reads "Now Sings in Heaven" to thank him for all the songs he gave us to sing down here on earth.







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
