

Fred and Emily – The Montana Sessions

For those of you who may not know, the Fred and Emily of this CD are the multi-talented Fred and Emily Frank from Idaho Falls, Idaho. They both bring lots of things to this CD. From Emily, it is her lovely voice and inspired songwriting. From Fred, it is his accomplished leads on three different instruments.

There's lots of things to like about this CD. The selection of songs, the vocal quality, the solid rhythm, the top notch instrumentals and the technical quality of the CD are all to be noted.

The songs repertoire is broad. It consists of five originals by Emily, four instrumentals, three well-chosen songs from the past and one gospel song. Taken together it is a thoroughly bluegrass CD.

Fred and Emily are assisted by a strong cast of musicians. Tari Conroy brings her solid rhythm guitar playing and harmony singing. Jeff Forbes is wonderful on fiddle and adds a quality missing in a lot of bluegrass albums of today. What can one say about Ivan Rosenberg? He adds much to any musical effort he is involved with. His dobro sound is especially appropriate given the soulful selection of some of the songs. Mike Conroy brings his bass fiddle rhythm playing but perhaps more importantly his skills in the technical quality of the CD.

Emily is outstanding with her vocals and her songwriting shines. Themes of lost love, pain of past relationships, personal growth, betrayal, and consequences of love thread throughout her songs.

Fred is featured on mandolin, banjo and guitar. All are thoroughly enjoyable. Fred is featured on mandolin, banjo and guitar. All are thoroughly enjoyable. He also shares the lead singing on a couple of the songs and provides harmony on some more.

This album is thoroughly enjoyable - great singing, great instrumentals, and great songs put together in a tight

Hit and Run Bluegrass By Caroline Keys

CK: What is your first memory of bluegrass music?

RH: When I was eleven or twelve. my parents took me and my brother to a bluegrass concert in Richmond, VA, where we grew up. It must have been a local or regional band, because I can't even remember their name, but we were enthralled by the harmonies.

CK:Does anyone in your family play?

RH: My mother and father sing, and they are great singers. My dad was in Glee Club in college! My mom played piano when I was little, and my great-grandmother was a church musician.

CK: Are there any challenges or obstacles you've come across as a woman in bluegrass?

RH: No; in fact, I find that people are nothing but supportive of women in bluegrass! OK--sometimes, there might be an attitude of "women can't play bluegrass," but I don't really let it bother me. There are too many inspiring women to look to as role models, like Alison Krauss and Bryn Davies.

CK: Are there any advantages to being a woman in bluegrass?

RH: When I used to walk up to a jam, people often skipped over me for solos. I was a girl holding a guitar, so they just assumed I wouldn't take a solo. It's fun to take a solo and break the stereotype. There are actually many, many prodigious women instrumentalists in bluegrass. I can't wait till the day that people assume a woman is going to be ripping through solos at a jam. Till then, I admit, it helps to have something unique, in that there aren't many women flatpickers. Another advantage is being

Interview with Rebecca Hoggan of able to sing high. Bluegrass is focused on a "high, lonesome sound ... " However, if everyone sang high, it would sound like a bunch of chipmunks! Thank goodness bluegrass isn't ALL women!

CK: Us Montanans are real proud that Larry Gangi Jr. is in good hands playing with Hit & Run. How's Larry doing?

RH: I can't begin to tell you what a



resounding response Larry has had in Boulder. When he flew down to audition in December, local pickers were saying, "Hire Larry! We need a great banjo player like that here in Colorado!" Larry plays with such phenomenal timing, and everyone appreciates his playing. He practically sold out of his CD's the first weekend he played with us. Larry has RH:I've met so many insanely tala great work ethic, and we can depend on him wholeheartedly. But he's fun and witty, and keeps us laughing in the van. We feel incredibly lucky that he wants to play with US!

CK: How about your other new band members, who are they? **RH:** Our new Dobro player is David Richey, from Tulsa, OK. He moved out from Johnson City, TN, where he

was in the bluegrass program at Eastern TN State University. He's a leftie Dobro player, and has a wonderful voice. Our guest bass player, and potentially our permanent bass player, is Steve Roy from New Hampshire. He's well versed in jazz, bluegrass,

folk, and other styles, and actually majored in music at UNH. He's also a great singer. So now we have five singers in the band--a first! CK: What kind of new material have they brought to the table? **RH:** Well, Larry has some great tunes he recorded on his solo outing, "Fistful of Lonesome." David has brought some great tunes that he sings--wonderful classic country and bluegrass songs. Steve actually sings Chuck Berry's "Maybelline" in the band, and the crowd goes nuts! David is our third singer, so our three-part harmonies have a different ring to them--two guys and one girl, instead of two girls and one guy. And since Steve is a pro jazz player, he's able to knock people over with his fluid, impressive bass solos. We also have the ability to mix up the singing combinations, which is fun--for example, sometimes the guys will do a 3-part harmony, and I'll just play guitar. Or Larry will sing bass--he has a wonderfully deep voice. Also, Larry plays guitar in the band on some ballads, and we LOVE his guitar playing.

CK:What is the difference between a "Colorado Bluegrasser" and a "Montana Bluegrasser?"

To be honest, I notice a common thread among Colorado and Montana bluegrassers. They are spectacular, well rooted musicians. Yet these folks enjoy living in a beautiful, mountain setting. so bluegrass is usually not the only element in their life. They may enjoy kayaking, hiking, skiing, or snowboarding as well. It's a great combination, music and the outdoors. \Box



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
